## CONFERENCE LOCATION

## University of Girona

The University of Girona, through its Faculty of Tourism and the UNESCO Chair in Cultural Policies and Cooperation, is responsible for co-organizing the IRTP conference. The institution has a recognized academic and research trajectory in the field of religious tourism, combining teaching with research projects, in cooperation with international organizations and local stakeholders. While the congress is coordinated by the University of Girona, it will be hosted at the Monastery of Montserrat, an emblematic and inspiring setting that embodies the theme of the meeting.

## About University of Girona and Montserrat Abbey

Montserrat is mountain, monastery, and sanctuary —a unique landmark where nature, culture, and spirituality meet. Located in the heart of Catalonia, is one of the most emblematic and spiritual landmarks of the region. Rising majestically with its distinctive serrated peaks, the mountain has inspired pilgrims, artists, and visitors for centuries. At its heart lies the Benedictine Monastery of Santa Maria de Montserrat, founded in the 11th century and home to the revered Black Madonna, a symbol of Catalan identity and devotion. In 2025, Montserrat celebrated the millennium of its foundation, marking a thousand years of uninterrupted history that blends faith, tradition, and community life.

The monastery complex combines religious tradition, cultural heritage, and natural beauty. Its basilica, museum, and library house invaluable artistic and historical treasures, while its Escolania boys' choir, one of the oldest in Europe, continues to enchant audiences with its daily performances. Beyond its spiritual significance, Montserrat offers breathtaking views and hiking trails that connect the sacred site to its natural surroundings, making it a unique place where culture, faith, and landscape meet.

Easily accessible from Barcelona, Montserrat has become both a major pilgrimage site and a cultural destination, welcoming thousands of visitors each year who seek inspiration, reflection, or simply the experience of its extraordinary setting. Today, Montserrat stands as an emblematic place of encounter, reflection, and inspiration, welcoming pilgrims, researchers, and visitors from around the world.

Rome – 1 hr. 55 min. Milan – 1 hr. 40 min.

Paris – 1 hr. 45 min.

London – 2 hrs. 15 min.

Berlin – 2 hrs. 45 min. New York – 8 hrs.

How to get to Montserrat from Barcelona

#### BY CAR

From Barcelona–El Prat Airport, Montserrat can be reached by car via the A-2 and C-55 highways. The distance is about 60 km, with a travel time of approximately 60–70 minutes. Parking is available near the monastery and at the base stations of the cable car (Aeri de Montserrat) and the rack railway (Cremallera).

#### **BY TRAIN**

From Barcelona's Plaça Espanya station, regular FGC trains (R5 line to Manresa) connect to the lower stations of Montserrat: Monistrol de Montserrat (for the Cremallera rack railway) or Aeri de Montserrat (for the cable car). Travel time from Barcelona to Montserrat Abbey is about 90 minutes, including transfer.

#### BY BUS

Direct buses to Montserrat depart from Barcelona (e.g. from Carrer Viriat, near Sants Station). The trip takes about 75 minutes and arrives at the monastery square.

#### BY TAXI OR PRIVATE TRANSFER

A taxi or private transfer from Barcelona–El Prat Airport to Montserrat takes about 60 minutes. Shared transfer services are also available and may offer a more economical option.

It is recommended to reach the monastery using either the Cremallera rack railway or the Aeri cable car, both of which provide a comfortable, sustainable, and scenic access to the sanctuary.

#### Accommodations

The best place to stay during the congress is the Monastery of Montserrat itself. As there are no night connections for the rack railway (Cremallera) or the cable car (Aeri), it is strongly recommended that participants remain accommodated on site throughout the days of the congress.

Montserrat offers several accommodation options, ranging from simple monastic cells to hotel rooms and a hostel. Detailed information about special rates and booking procedures for congress participants will be provided shortly. Please note that the opening day of the congress is 24 June, which is a public holiday in Catalonia. Participants are advised to carefully check the schedules of the different means of transport. In addition, those planning to arrive on 23 June should be aware that it is the night of the midsummer festival (revetlla de Sant Joan), when accommodation demand is very high both in Barcelona and Montserrat. Early booking is therefore strongly recommended.

- 3 key bibliographic references at the end of the abstract.
